From airport: The Atlanta- Hartsfield-Jackson (ATL) airport is 12 miles from the Atlanta Marriott Marquis.



- Marta Rail Map for Atlanta shows the rail path from airport to Peachtree Center, closest stop to the hotel.





# Earn professional development credits at the 2011 Career Clusters™ Institute
