
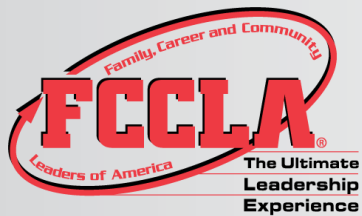

MAKING AN IMPACT

With more than 2 million student members combined, these 11 organizations have a definite impact on student's overall college and career readiness.



Students who participate in CTSOs demonstrate higher levels of academic engagement and motivation, civic engagement, career self-efficacy and employability skills than other students.



According to the National Research Center for Career and Technical Education, participating in leadership and professional development activities in a CTSO raises students' educational aspirations.



Students who participate in school organizations in 10th grade have higher grade point averages and are more likely to be enrolled in college at 21 than other students.

DID YOU KNOW?

CTE programs are supported at the federal level by the **Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act**, which provides approximately \$1.2 billion dollars in state grants annually to serve more than 14 million students nationwide.

Career and Technical Student Organizations are comprised of 11 not-for-profit organizations, specifically authorized by the U.S. Congress in the Perkins Act.

CTSOs align with the 16 career clusters and 79 Career Pathways recognized by CTE.

CTE STATE OVERVIEW

At the secondary level, CTE is delivered through comprehensive high schools; area technology centers; supplemental CTE programs to both high-school-enrolled youths and adults; and skills centers, which serve adult inmates for success in the workplace and in the community. At the postsecondary level, CTE is delivered through community and technical colleges and area technology centers, which provide CTE programs at the postsecondary levels. Adults in the correctional system also receive education and training through skills centers.

TECHNICAL STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS IN OKLAHOMA

Technical Student Organizations extend Career and Technical Education through networks of programs, business and community partnership experiences at the school, state and national levels. These organizations provide Oklahoma students with academic, technical and employability knowledge and skills for the workforce.

For Fiscal Year 2012, the same as in 2011 and \$1.6 million was distributed to local recipients, 86 percent go to postsecondary.



Learning that works.

Nine organizations. One common mission.

Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) provide the American education system the tools to educate the student for college and the careers in ways that are uniquely American. By integrating into Career and Technical Education programs and courses, CTSOs extend teaching and learning through networks of programs, business and community partnerships and leadership experiences at the school, state and national levels with different opportunities to learn academic, technical and employability skills, which American business and industry say are necessary in today's workforce.

Connecting classrooms to a large network.

Each of the nine CTSOs focus on specific career fields and tailor their programing to the students, teachers and businesses in those fields. With its singular focus on a specific set of career areas (Career Clusters), each CTSO works with business and industry,

development in unique ways. Each organization operates independently with school-based chapters, state-based associations and national offices creating opportunities and experiences that a school or even a state could not achieve on their own.

At the national, state and local levels, CTSOs offer diverse programming that is designed to enhance classroom instruction and four common organizational goals: academic and career achievement, leadership development, professional development; and community service.

At the local level, CTSO chapters operate in-school, co-curricular programs led by CT teachers as advisers in middle schools, high schools and postsecondary institutions.

The U.S. Congress has specifically authorized CTSOs in the Perkins Act, and they operate as national not-for-profit organizations or state associations and local school districts. Funds from the Perkins Act can be used by local CTSOs.

Students are the heart of each organization.
