Fun fact: Oklahoma has a large Native American population and has focused deliberately on addressing the needs
of those learners. Both the secondary and postsecondary education agencies employ a full-time staff member to
liaise with the state's 39 tribes.<sup>5</sup>

## **CTE Works for Oklahoma's Economy**

- Middle-skill jobs those requiring some postsecondary education and training, but not a Bachelor's degree account for 55 percent of Oklahoma's labor market.
- However, only 47 percent of workers in Oklahoma are qualified to fill these middle-skill jobs, <sup>7</sup> leading to a skills gap that CTE can help address.
- In total, 26,333 associate's degrees or certificates were awarded in Oklahoma in 2015 about 47 percent of all postsecondary degrees and certificates.8



In Oklahoma, the top middle-skill occupations with the highest projected job openings are in the Health Science Career Cluster.<sup>6</sup>
