#### **Getting to Know PAYA: Sarah Oldmixon**

Q: How is the PAYA initiative seeking to improve the connection between youth apprenticeships and Career Technical Education?

**A.** It's no secret that aligning classroom instruction with hands-on learning in the workplace enhances the high school CTE experience and better prepares

learners for career success. Some of our efforts to foster stronger connections between youth apprenticeships and CTE include:

- Encouraging youth apprenticeship programs to recruit from high school CTE programs.
- Lifting up opportunities to leverage Perkins V resources to support youth apprenticeship.
- Helping youth apprenticeship programs explore options to leverage CTE coursework particularly dual enrollment programs - as related technical instruction for apprenticeships.
- Ensuring that K12 partners are at the table as a core member of youth apprenticeship partnerships.
- Leveraging the expertise of Advance CTE as one of PAYA's National Partners.



Q: Equity is one of PAYA's guiding principles for high-quality youth apprenticeship. What's one example of a strategy PAYA uses to advance equity in youth apprenticeships?

**A.** As part of our equity work, PAYA has placed a strong emphasis on growing the data collection and analysis capacity of our field partners.

High-quality data is an important component of a strong youth apprenticeship program because it allows leaders to evaluate impact, monitor equity, identify promising practices, and make the case for youth apprenticeships to employers and young people. Examining disaggregated data can help intermediaries target services and supports to address disparities.

Some of our efforts in this arena include a 2020 workgroup led and facilitated by Advance CTE, the creation of a Youth Apprenticeship Data Framework, and the publication of several data resources, including Improving Youth Apprenticeship Data Quality: Challenges and Opportunities and Building A Youth Apprenticeship Data Ecosystem: A Starter Kit.

Building on this past work, Advance CTE is launching a new data learning series for PAYA Network members in early 2024.

#### Q. What is a recent development for PAYA that you're excited about?

**A.** It's too hard to choose just one! We have two new initiatives launching over the next couple of months that I'm particularly excited about. The first is the PAYA National Youth Leadership Council. The NYLC will bring together a small group of current and former youth apprentices to spread the word about the value of youth apprenticeship and improve youth apprenticeship for other young people around the country. We've selected a highly diverse group of 15 youth and young adults from across the country for our inaugural cohort, which will come together for their first meeting later this month.

Another new development is that we're preparing to launch a **PAYA Resource Library** in early 2024. The Library will bring together all of the resources that PAYA has produced and collected from our partners over the past five years on one website. The site will offer advanced search capabilities and curated topic guides to make it easier to find helpful information and resources.

Advance CTE's Associate Director of Data and Research, Dan Adams, has been a critical partner on the planning committees for both of these initiatives. We're incredibly grateful for his contributions and insights!


